In Germany, 30 % of persons with an obligation to leave are women, many of them with children. However, so far existing return and reintegration programs generally do not respond to their special needs. In order to better address the return and reintegration of women this ad hoc query tries to get a more closer look on the situation in other Member States.

5. In 2018-2019 Caritas implemented in Cameroon an AMIF programme targeting women with a view to foster their reintegration. The programme aimed at supporting women in creating sustainable activities as well as reinforcing the links between them.
6. In 2018-2019, Cartias implemented in Chechnya an AMIF programme targeting families with children. After a long stay in Belgium, these children may encounter difficulties with the native language and generally need psychological support. Indeed, they were not always involved in the choice of return and may encounter difficulties in settling in a completely new and unknown "country of origin". Caritas has therefore offered an educational support to allow these children to go to school despite the lack of knowledge of the national language. Caritas also organised sessions with psychologists in which children were able to discuss their return.

To this end, unaccompanied children, single mothers, families are eligible for reintegration assistance, which is tailor-made to address their individual needs and includes assistance to set up an income-generating activity, medical support, housing/accommodation.</li> </ol>

+	EMN REG Practitioners Finland	Yes	<ol> <li>In total there is 6014 people in Finland with an obligation to leave, 1539 of those are women, which makes 25.6 % of the total.</li> <li>This number is counted by looking at the amount of people in the reception system with at least one negative decision. This however does not mean that this amount of people would be waiting for removal from the country. In many cases the appeal is being handled in the court or they are about to leave a subsequent application. Only 500 persons are in the system with a final return decision. Finland also has some thousands of people outside the reception system, they have been customers of the system but they cannot be returned to their countries of origin after return decision.</li> </ol>

In Germany there are 249.922 persons with an obligation to leave the country in total, including 64.007 minors (25.61%) [as of December 31, 2019]. 5. One of the most important actors in Germany specialising in the assistance of women within the framework of return and reintegration projects/programmes is SOLWODI (Solidarity with Women in Distress). SOLWODI addresses women from third countries who have suffered violence, forced marriages, human trafficking or are otherwise vulnerable. The project is subsidised by the state and has special counselling centres throughout Germany. Women, can take advantage of various assistances (travel and freight cost subsidies, initial (emergency) financial assistance in the home country, vocational training and further education, support for setting up a business, job placement/job- creation measures e.g. wage subsidies). In a first individual counselling session, perspectives for the future are elaborated together. In the country of origin, an NGO cooperating with SOLWODI is usually responsible for advising and accompanying the returnee on site. SOLWODI maintains long-term contact with the returnee and the NGO. Besides this project, there are also minor projects regarding special counselling for women with components for reintegration in the country of origin. 6. Within the framework of the ERRIN (European Return and Reintegration Network) project, special consideration can be given to women and children with regard to reintegration services. For example, single women belong to a vulnerable group of people and can be subsidised with an increased amount of in-kind assistance. The reintegration support also facilitates purchasing school utensils for children. Since August 2019 there is a complementary reintegration project to ERRIN for voluntary returnees (ERIN AP 2016) with a special component for women (Training and Employment for Women). The aim

Besides, no NGOs or other association in Luxembourg is intervening in the reintegration of women returning to their countries of origin.</li> <li>The IOM program does not have a specific component for women except if they are considered as vulnerable. In that case, as said above, an additional reintegration support is given in the country of origin through the program via the IOM office in the country of origin. 			<ul> <li>5. No, there are no organizations in the Netherlands who specifically deal with reintegration of women in the country of origin. All organizations who are financed by the Dutch government, aim at the reintegration of both women and men.</li> <li>6. Yes, some programmes and projects aim specifically at the reintegration of women. A specific part of the AVRR project of IOM is the return and reintegration of victims of trafficking. A significant part of this group consists of women, some who were forced to work in the sex industry. Furthermore the Rotterdam based NGO ROS (stichting Rotterdams Ongedocumenteerden Steunpunt) has an activity which aims at the return and reintegration of single women from Morocco.</li> <li>Part of the Dutch reintegration policy is that the reintegration budget for children is €2.800 per child. The reintegration budget for adults is €1.800. This budget is provided to individual migrants and families by IOM and Dutch NGO's.</li> </ul>

Instead, all women and children who return will receive personal support. Women are supported for income-generating activities and children are primarily offered education.</li> <li>Swedish Red Cross are currently running a EU AMIF sponsored project with focus on strengthening our response to returnees and individual needs returnees.</li> <li>The main components within the project is to train and raise awareness of the return issue among our volunteers, and other stakeholders, who often come in contact with potential returnees. We offer training to these groups regarding the process in order to be able to answer basic questions from the returnee as well as how to offer basic psycho social support to a person who has been refused asylum and I facing return.</li> <li>Another main component of the project is to strengthen our international cooperation and network within our own Movement, ie other Red Cross /Red Crescent National Societies.</li> <li>Swedish Red Cross do not have a designated program or specific funding to provide reintegration support for returnees after having been returned to their country of origin. This means that the support we may offer is</li> </ul>					5,	

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	dependent on the cooperation and good will of our sister organizations to provide information and access to their already existing domestic programs. This could include integration activities, social activities for vulnerable groups or distribution of basic material goods such as food- or hygiene parcels. It may also include on-going activities relating to psychosocial support, legal advice or health related activities among vulnerable groups. Often these are activities are focus on women and women's needs. In the project we have identified women, among others, as a particularly vulnerable group among returnees as they often find themselves in a very difficult situation after having been returned to their country of origin. We are therefore very concerned to put some extra efforts in our dialogue and cooperation with other national societies to research into the availability of support especially offered to woman and their particular needs.
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
